Science Activity

How Do Animals Stay Warm in the Winter?

Many Arctic animals have very thick fur to keep them warm. Arctic animals that swim in the ocean have a thick layer of blubber under their fur to keep them warm. What is blubber? Fat! Try this experiment at home with your child. You only need a few items to help your child explore what it feels like to be insulated in "blubber" and submerged in ice water.

You Will Need:

- large bowl
- ice
- cold water
- 4 Ziploc bags (sandwich or bigger)
- vegetable shortening

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
